WHAT WAS THE CONFLICT ABOUT?

- On March 13, the Presidents of both countries signed a landmark agreement, putting an end to the dispute once and for all.
- The border between Kyrgyzstan and Tajikistan has been contested for **decades**, leading to clashes over land, water, and resources.
- X In 2021, tensions erupted into violence.
- In 2022, armed conflict broke out.
- But behind the scenes, brave leaders, activists, and everyday people worked tirelessly to build peace.





HOW DID PEACE HAPPEN?

- Ceasefire Agreement: After the 2022 conflict, both sides agreed to stop the fighting.
- 2+ Years of Talks: High-level officials met regularly to find a lasting solution.
- People-Powered Peace: A group of activists, journalists, and experts from both countries built bridges through dialogue and trust.

This wasn't just politics—this was people taking peace into their own hands.





WHY THIS MATTERS

- Regional Stability: This deal brings peace to one of the most densely populated regions in the world.
- Economic Growth: With open borders, trade and business can thrive.
- A Global Win for Diplomacy: The world is watching—this proves that talking works better than fighting.





THE UNSUNG HEROES

While governments negotiated, courageous individuals on both sides took action:

- Kyrgyz & Tajik peacebuilders risked everything to keep dialogue alive.
- Expert groups helped leaders understand the real impact of war.
- People's diplomacy ensured the public was ready for peace, not war.
